Fire Department Offers Heating Safety Tips



The high cost of home heating fuels and utilities have caused many homeowners to search for alternative methods of home heating. The use of wood burning stoves is growing, space heaters are selling and more people are using their fireplaces. All of these methods of heating are acceptable, however they can become a major contributing factor in residential fires. The Winthrop Harbor Fire Department offers the following safety tips to help residents maintain a fire-safe home this winter:

- Be sure the fireplace or wood stove is installed properly. Wood stoves should have adequate clearance (36") from combustible surfaces and proper floor support and protection.
- Wood stoves should be of good quality, solid construction and design, and should be UL listed.
- Have the chimney inspected annually and cleaned, especially if it has not been used for some time.
- Do not use flammable liquids to start or accelerate any fire.
- Keep a glass or metal screen in front of the fireplace opening.
- Do not use excessive amounts of paper to build roaring fires in fireplaces. It

OPEN GYM - On ***Mondays and Tuesdays*** the Schlader Building is open to the public for two hours of gym time from 7-9 pm. The fee is \$2 for residents, \$3 for non-residents, and all participants must be High School age or older. Volleyball is on Monday, and Basketball on Tuesday.

Walkin'-Walkin' - Come indoors from 8 to 10am on Mondays through Fridays at the Schlader Recreation Center to walk & talk while staying warm & dry. Don't let winter slow you down!

BASEBALL / SOFTBALL REGISTRATION - Calling all ball players! This year's sign-ups will be from **Monday Feb. 20th** through **Friday Mar. 17th**. Registration forms will be available at Village Hall and at the Schlader Building. On Feb. 20th and 21st from 6-8pm sign-ups will be taken at the Schlader Building. Forms may also be submitted on Saturdays or Sundays at the Schlader Building as the basketball season continues. It is impera-

tive that registration forms are submitted at either Village Hall or the Schlader Building during this four week stretch in order to secure a spot in this year's league. Registrations after March 25 will be placed on a waiting list with the only possibility of playing being if another player chooses to exit the league. Tee Ball starts at age 5 for boys and girls, and the oldest age groups will be 18 for girls, 14 for boys. This year we're dividing age groups for girls softball to try and keep age and skill levels a little more consistent and closer. Ages will be divided by every 2 years. Pee-Wee girls will be 7-8 years, Jr. Girls will be 9-10 and Sr. Girls will be ages 11-12. Teams of 13-15 years and 16-18 years will participate in League play against surrounding towns, traveling for half of their scheduled games. The communities of Zion and Beach Park are also making this change in age groups in order for us all to compete against each other for our seasons. For information on this year's fees, or to get involved as a coach, sponsor or umpire, please call 847-746-3505. Practices start the end of April and will run at most twice a week. Games will begin end of May, with games on weeknights with Saturdays used as makeup days.

Mailbox Repair/Replacement Policy

The Winthrop Harbor Public Works Dept. has a policy to repair or replace mailboxes and/or posts damaged by Village snow plows. Residents are advised that the policy applies only if the mailbox was located according to the USPS specifications, or if the snowplow jumped the curb or plowed beyond the road shoulder and physically struck the box or post.

If replacement of the box is necessary, a standard rural type mailbox approved by the postal service will be used. If replacement of the post is necessary, a treated or cedar 4x4 wood post will be used. If the property owner desires a non-standard mailbox or post, the Village will reimburse for materials only to a maximum of \$35. Reimbursement will only be made after the owner installs the items to postal service specifications and provides proof of purchase in the form of a dated sales receipt to the Public Works department.

If the mailbox was not installed according to post office specifications (i.e. too close to curb, hanging over curb, etc.) then the department will only attempt to repair the damaged pieces versus providing replacement. Any necessary replacement will be the responsibility of the property owner.

Damage caused by snow thrown by the plow is not covered under this policy. In all cases, a representative from the Public Works Dept. will inspect the mailbox site. The Superintendent of Public Works or his designee will determine what course of action to follow and will advise the property owner. For further information please call the Public Works Dept. is possible to ignite creosote in the chimney by overbuilding the fire.

- Never burn charcoal indoors. Doing so can give off lethal amounts of carbon monoxide.
- Keep flammable materials away from your fireplace mantel. A spark from the fireplace could easily ignite these materials.
- Before going to sleep, be sure your fire is completely out. NEVER close your damper with hot ashes in the fireplace. A closed damper will help the fire heat up again and will force toxic carbon monoxide into the house.
- If synthetic logs are used, follow the package directions. NEVER break a synthetic log apart to quicken the fire or use more than one log at a time. They can burn unevenly, releasing higher levels of carbon monoxide.

Branch Pickups— Homeowner trimmed branches and branches from storm damage are picked up the first Monday of each month. Cut ends must be put toward the curb. Please call 847-746-2100 to be added to the pickup list.

Housing Assistance— Do you know someone looking to buy a home? The Affordable Housing Corporation, a local non-profit agency, offers a variety of low-interest mortgages, down payment assistance options and educational programs that can help. Circuit Breaker Program— Seniors or persons with disabilities may pick up a Circuit Breaker application form at the Benton Township office in Beach Park. The program offers discounts for license plates, pharmaceutical assistance or a possible cash grant to qualified persons. Information is also available online at www.state.il.us/aging.

Discount Taxi Service— A half-fare taxi program is available for Benton Township seniors (65 or older) and disabled residents. Maximum is \$3 and you must apply in person at the township office, 40023 N. Green Bay Road in Beach Park.

Senior Dining Program— Seniors who are age 60 and over have the opportunity to enjoy a meal 7 days a week for a suggested donation of only \$3.50 per meal. The actual cost of the meal is \$6.00, however the balance is covered by funding received through the Northeastern Illinois Area Agency on Aging and Catholic Charities. To participate in the Senior Nutrition Program you can obtain an application form at the Benton Township office. The program's dining sites are *The Avalon Family Restaurant*, 4821 Grand Avenue in Gurnee (847-244-0777), and *Paragon Restaurant*, 2101 Grand Avenue in Waukegan (847-623-6820).

Medicare Shoe Program— Many diabetes patients may be unaware of the benefits available under the Congress approved *Therapeutic Shoe Bill*. Under the Medicare Shoe Program seniors with

diabetes covered by Medicare or Medicaid are entitled to one pair of therapeutic shoes annually and 3 custom insoles a no cost. For more information please call 847-340-9597.

Free Emergency Cell Phones— Benton Township residents may apply in person at the township office for a free emergency cell phone. The phones are programmed for calling 911 only. Please call 847-746-2100 for details.



Prescription Discount Card

Residents may visit the Benton Township office to obtain a NACO Prescription Discount Card, which provides an average of 20% savings on prescription drugs. There are no membership or enrollment fees, and the card may be used anytime a prescription is not covered by insurance.

Higher discounts are available on selected medications as well as high-tech and injectable drugs. Up to 50% savings may be available through the mail-order program.
