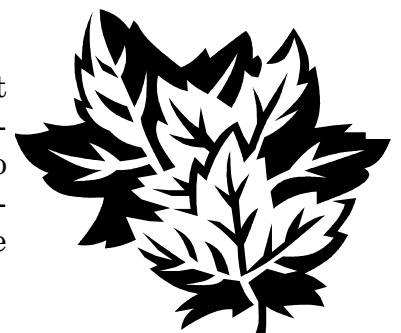

Recreation Department News and Activities

WALKIN' WALKIN' - Starting in October, come indoors from 8am to 10am on Mondays through Fridays at the Schlader Recreation Center to walk & talk while staying warm & dry. (note that the gym is closed on holidays.)

TEEN DANCE — The Recreation Dept. will host Teen Dances from 7pm-10pm on Friday, **Sep. 8th & Oct. 13th** at the Schlader Building. Students attending 5th-8th grades at Winthrop Harbor schools may attend, as well as students who live in Winthrop Harbor but attend alternative schools. (Students attending alternative schools, please call ahead so we can add you to the list for entry into the dance.) Admission is only \$2, and pizza & soda will be available for sale. Please note that the normal school dress code is strictly enforced, and once you've entered the dance you may only leave when it's over at 10pm, unless a parent comes to the door to pick you up earlier. No one will be allowed to walk or ride a bike home. This is the first dance of the new school year, come out and dance to all of your favorite music! BASEBALL / SOFTBALL SEASON ENDS — Another youth baseball/softball season has passed, giving way to the start of school and cooler weather to come. This year's softball leagues saw another change in age groups to further help make the skill levels of each group more consistent. The Pee-Wee league is for girls age 7-8; Jr. Girls is for age 9-10, and Sr. Girls age 11-12. We made this transition along with the Beach Park teams that each age group played against. These new ages proved to be more beneficial in the sense that the age gap between players did not exceed one year, as opposed to 2+ years in the past. Based on rained out games and lengthening of the season, the Sr. Girls were the only groups who played an end of year tournament with Beach Park. Our teams finished 4th and below respectively.

We added an age 16-18 girl's team this year, to go along with a 13-15 team. These teams played against Avon, Beach Park, Zion, Woodstock, and other teams from out West.

There were also age 13 and age 14 boy's travel teams. They played in two different leagues, playing teams from Gurnee to Winnetka. Look for tryouts for these teams later in the fall.

The Rec. Dept. would like to thank all of the coaches who spent a great amount of their personal time teaching and working with the kids. Thank you to the umpires for their help in teaching the kids, team sponsors for your generous donations, and parents who cheer and support not only your own kids but all involved. It is because of

individuals like you that the program continues to grow and be successful.

Façade Grant Program Announced

The Department of Economic Development, under the direction of the Economic Development Committee and Trustee Terry Isaacs, is pleased to announce an incentive program intended to encourage the rehabilitation of buildings and structures in the Sheridan Road business corridor. Commercial buildings facing Sheridan Road from 1st Street to 15th Street, and those located on 7th Street from Whitney Avenue to Landon Avenue, will qualify to make application to the new Façade Grant Program.

Needed improvements will help to create a cleaner and more attractive environment that encourages new businesses to locate in the area while increasing customer traffic to existing businesses. Grants of up to \$2,000 per building/business space will be made available starting May 1, 2007. Funding for this program will be capped at \$10,000 annually and the program will expire after five years. The Department of Economic Development will begin accepting applications immediately, and each will be considered on a "first come, first served" basis. Therefore it is important to get your application in early.

Incentives will be offered to promote improvement that is physically and architecturally compatible with standards established by a Design Review Committee. The committee make-up will include individuals with appropriate background and experience, and the standards will encourage a unified theme for this shopping district.

This Façade Grant Program shows the commitment of the Village to support its business community. In this, the Mayor and Board of Trustees have acknowledged the important role that our local businesses will play in the future viability of our Village. All residents can show their support by remembering to shop locally first. *"Winthrop Harbor—Open For Business!"*

General Election Information

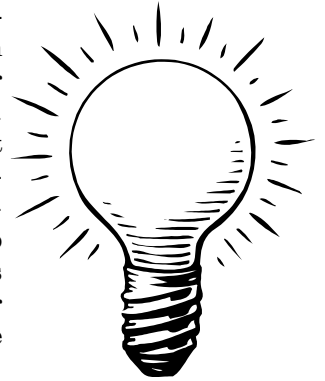
Residents are reminded that **Oct. 10th** is the official "Close of voter registration at the offices of municipal and township clerks and with deputy registrars and agencies." The next general election will be held on Tuesday, **Nov. 7th**, and voter registration reopens on Nov. 9th.

You may register to vote if you are a U.S. citizen at least 18 years of age, and a resident of your Lake County precinct address for 30 days immediately prior to an election. Two forms of identification are required to register, including at least one that shows your name and current address (only one may be a piece of mail). You may register with the Village Clerk at Winthrop Harbor Village Hall, or at the County Clerk's office in Waukegan.

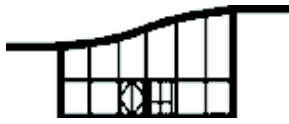
CARE includes a variety of energy efficiency, low-income programs and a rate stabilization proposal to help keep residential customers' bills affordable.

Rate stabilization: Keeping rates low. ComEd has submitted a proposal to the Illinois Commerce Commission to cap residential rate increases over a three-year period from 2007-2009. Costs that exceed the caps would be deferred and recovered over three years, from 2010 to 2012.

Energy efficiency: Managing your use and saving money. ComEd has developed a broad program and customer education campaign to encourage northern Illinois residents to use electricity more efficiently. At www.comedcare.com, customers can submit energy-savings questions to the Energy Doctor, access a provider of discounted energy saving products, view energy efficiency tips or conduct an online energy audit. This fall ComEd will provide customers an opportunity to purchase 1 million ENERGY STAR® compact fluorescent light (CDL) bulbs at a discount.

Low income assistance: Providing help to those in need. In 2006, ComEd will make a \$1 million donation to the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) to help eligible customers with their electricity bills. Additionally, CARE will offer eligible LIHEAP participants four free ENERGY STAR® CFL bulbs. Other programs will continue such as Reduced Energy Needs for the Elderly, which provides low-income seniors with energy efficient products and services.

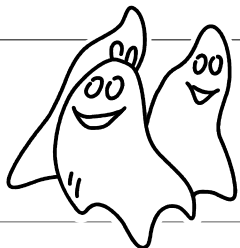
